Government Type: parliamentary constitutional monarchy

Capital: Madrid

Population: 49.3 million

Area: 505,370 square kilometers, slightly more than twice the size of Oregon

General Terrain: sandy beaches; flat plains; high, rocky cliffs

Climate: temperate; clear, hot summers and cloudy, cold winters in the interior; more moderate and cloudier in summer with partly cloudy and cool winters along the coast

Major Cities: Madrid (3.5 million), Barcelona (1.7 million), Valencia (850,000)

Language: Spanish with several regional official languages – Catalan, Galician, Basque, Aranese

Religions: Roman Catholic 67.4%, atheist or agnostic 20-22%, Evangelical Christian 1.6%

Interesting Facts:

- Spain and Portugal share the **Iberian Peninsula**, which is bordered by the Atlantic Ocean, the Bay of Biscay and the Mediterranean Sea.
- Spain is home to the world's **oldest restaurant** (over 300 years old).
- The **Canary Islands** are volcanic, known for black sand and wild canary birds.
- Many shops close in the afternoon for a break (*siesta*) and reopen later.
- Spain exports **oranges from Valencia**.
- A New Year's tradition in Spain is eating **12 grapes**, one for each strike of the clock, to bring good luck.
- The **Spanish national anthem has no words**.

- Spain produces nearly **half of the world's olive oil** and is believed to have the most olive trees in the world.
- Madrid, the capital city, sits in the **center of the country**.
- Dinner is typically **eaten late (9 or 10 p.m.)**.

Up Close – Spain

The Land

Spain is the **fourth-largest country in Europe**. It has land on the European mainland and also has several islands. The country is separated from the continent of Africa by the **Straight of Gibraltar**. At its narrowest part, this strait is only 8.9 miles wide.

The **Pyrenees (PEER-uh-nee-z) Mountains** cover 260 miles along the border between Spain and France. These mountains are popular for hiking and skiing. Five national parks protect bears, wolves, wildcats, wild boars and tarantulas. You'll also find macaws, foxes, lynx, snakes, rabbits and lizards.

“Frutas y Verduras” is Spanish for “fruits and vegetables.” Spain grows almonds, apples, apricots, grapes, lemons, oranges, olives, peaches, pears, wheat and barley. Farmers also raise sheep, goats and pigs.

Culture

Spaniards love to celebrate. There are more festivals in Spain than there are days in the year.

At the beginning of spring, there is a festival in Valencia where the local people fill the streets with large, **towering papier-mâché sculptures** that represent famous people or traditions. Later they burn them – it is like a huge bonfire across the city.

Every August, the city of Bunol holds **a huge food fight**. People flood the streets and throw truckloads of tomatoes at each other.

The **Running of the Bulls** takes place from July 6 to 14. The city of Pamplona celebrates the beginning of bullfighting season. Bulls are released in the streets guided by barriers. Men show their courage and speed by running ahead of the bulls to the bull ring.

Many other festivals across the country have cultural performances, live music, giant puppets, fireworks, floats and – of course – lots of food.

Things to do if you visit:

- Take a hike in the **Pyrenees Mountains**.
- Watch a **fútbol (soccer)** game.
- Visit the **Canary Islands**.
- Enjoy **tapas** throughout your day. *Tapas* are appetizers or snacks eaten throughout the day.
- Eat **tortilla española**, the most common food in Spain. This is an omelet made of potatoes, eggs, onions, salt and pepper.
- Experience a **local festival**.

The Beginning of the Free Methodist Church in Spain

The work in Spain started with Eduardo and Cindi Angelo. While they were working in Portugal, they met a couple from northern Spain who had studied the Bible and wanted to help people in Spain learn about God.

In May 2004, that couple moved to Madrid – the capital of Spain – to start new churches. Later, in the summer of 2005, Josh and Susy Fajardo came to help.

In September 2006, the Fajardos started a new church in Rivas-Vaciamadrid, a town near Madrid. A few years later, on December 4, 2008, the government officially recognized their church group. In May 2009, the church group was also accepted by a group of churches in Spain.

Meanwhile, a church on the Canary Islands heard about them through a family member who became a pastor. That church joined them in January 2007.

Another church in a town called Mazarrón, made up of people from Britain, joined in December 2009.

What is the Church in Spain Doing Today?

There are seven Free Methodist churches in Spain, and they have another four groups of people who meet together; we sometimes call them church plants or developing churches.

The Free Methodist Church in Spain is sharing the good news about Jesus and starting new churches in places like Madrid, Galicia and the Canary Islands. They also hope to start churches in other parts of Spain in the future.

One way they help people is through a place called the Mosaico Learning Center. There, kids and families can learn languages and receive extra help with schoolwork.

Leaders are trained to follow and teach others about Jesus at a special school called John Wesley Seminary.

The church also helps people in need in places like La Cañada Real and Hortaleza in Madrid. La Cañada Real and Hortaleza are neighborhoods where people live together, go to school and play in parks, but some families don't have much and need extra help. The church visits these places to be kind, help people and share God's love – like helping kids, supporting families, and being good friends to everyone.

More About Mosaico Center

The Mosaico Learning Center is a special place where kids and families can go to learn and get help with schoolwork.

If a child is having trouble with homework or learning, the teachers at Mosaico help them understand it better. They also teach English and even music, like piano. Kids can come after school to learn and practice new skills.

The people at Mosaico also help parents. If moms or dads have questions about school or how to help their kids learn, they can talk to them and get good ideas. There are even English classes for adults.

The center tries to help families who don't have a lot of money by making classes cheaper. Caring for the children and showing love to them sometimes gives teachers opportunities to share about Jesus.

Pray for the Churches

- Pray for the churches in Spain to grow and help more people learn about Jesus.
- Pray for the people in Madrid, Galicia and the Canary Islands to feel God's love.
- Pray that new churches can be started in more places in Spain.

Pray for Families and Kids

- Pray for kids at the Mosaico Center to do well in school and enjoy learning.
- Pray for families who need help, that they will feel cared for and supported.
- Pray for children in places like La Cañada Real and Hortaleza to be safe and happy.

Pray for Leaders and Teachers

- Pray for pastors and leaders as they learn and teach others about Jesus.
- Pray for teachers at the Mosaico Center to have wisdom and patience as they help students.

Pray for Hope and Help

- Pray for people who are struggling to find hope, help and good friends.
- Pray that the church can show kindness and love to everyone they meet.

When the Church Prays

Merly lives in **Madrid, Spain**. She left Ecuador many years ago to begin a new life in Spain. Just a few years ago, she began going to a Bible study group led by missionaries Camilo and Magaly. There, she learned about **Jesus** and how much He loves everyone.

Merly's heart felt happy and full, and soon she decided to follow Jesus. Not long after that, she was baptized! Merly loves helping others. She helps at church with money matters and prepares **love baskets** filled with food and clothes for families who need help.

Merly has a husband named **Juan**. Juan was a mechanic who had worked hard all his life. He loves Merly, and he didn't stop her from going to church, but he **did not believe in God**. He told Merly, "I don't believe, and I will never go to church." Still, Merly prayed for him – and so did the church.

Then one day, something very sad happened.

Juan fell outside a grocery store and could not get up. An ambulance rushed him to the hospital. After many tests, the doctors said hard words: "Juan may never walk again."

But the church **kept praying**.

Friends from church visited Juan in the hospital. They shared scripture from the Bible, sang songs and prayed with him. They told him how Jesus offers peace even in difficult situations. As they prayed, Juan felt something amazing. He felt peace. He felt **God's presence**. And right there in the hospital room, Juan asked **Jesus to be his Savior**.

Suddenly, Juan felt his shoulders and arms begin to move. Everyone watching was amazed! God was doing something wonderful.

Juan stayed in the hospital for a very long time – 18 months. He had surgeries and therapy and learned to use a wheelchair. It was hard. Merly worked every day and visited Juan as often as she could. But she never stopped hoping. She knew **God hears prayers** and could heal Juan.

Little by little, Juan began to move his hands. Then his feet. One day, he stood. Later, he began **walking slowly**, but with some difficulty. God answered the prayers of His people!

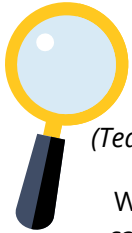
Today, Juan is at home, learning how to live again. The church ladies help by bringing meals made with love. Juan has not gone to church yet – but everyone believes he will soon.

Because when God's people pray together, **great and wonderful things happen!**



EXPLORE MORE

Praying for Others



(Teachers, you may want to combine the Explore More with the Adventure in Prayer Activity for this lesson.)

When God's people pray, amazing things can happen. In our adventure story, the church in Spain prayed for Juan, and God touched his life, giving him the ability to move again.

(Teachers, find full scripture references on page 12. You can cut these apart and assign students to read them.)

The Bible teaches us that prayer is powerful. In James 5:14-16, the Apostle James instructed the church to pray for those who are sick. He encouraged believers to pray not only for physical healing but also for forgiveness, spiritual healing, and restored relationships with God and others.

"The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective."

— James 5:16

The Apostle Paul also included many prayers in his New Testament letters. These prayers show us what is important to pray for in our own lives and in the lives of others.

Pray for Wisdom and Spiritual Growth

In Ephesians 1:17-19, Paul prayed that believers would:

- Grow in wisdom and understanding
- Know Jesus more
- Understand that Jesus gives us hope and we can trust His promises
- Experience God's power and strength to help us do what's right

Pray to Understand God's Love

In Ephesians 3:14-20, Paul prayed that believers would:

- Be strengthened by God's help
- Remember how much God loves us
- Understand how great and amazing Jesus' love is
- Be filled with the fullness of God's love every day
- Live in a way that shows others Who He is

Pray for God's Direction

In Colossians 1:9-10, Paul prayed that believers would be filled with the knowledge of God's will and live lives that please Him. We can pray that:

- God will help us know what He wants us to do
- God will help us be wise and make good choices
- God will help us do good things for others each day
- God will help us grow closer to Him

Pray About Everything

In Philippians 4:5-7, Paul encourages believers not to be controlled by worry. Instead, we should bring every concern, need and thankfulness to God in prayer.

When we do, God promises to give us His peace – a peace that goes beyond what we can understand and that guards our hearts and minds in Christ.

What Can We Pray For?

- If someone is sick or hurting, we can pray that God makes them better.
- Wisdom and understanding. We can ask God to help people make good choices and understand what is right.
- Sometimes people feel scared, tired or sad. We can pray that God makes them strong in their hearts.
- We can ask God to help others understand Him and become close friends with Him.
- God's love is big and amazing! We can pray that others understand how much He loves them.

- We can pray that people feel happy and hopeful because they know God loves them and has a good plan for them.
- When people are worried, we can pray that God gives them peace and calm feelings.
- We can pray that people learn, grow and do good things that please God.
- We can ask God to help people trust Jesus and feel His love every day.
- We can tell God what we need and thank Him, trusting that He will help us.

God cares about every part of our lives, and He invites us to bring every need to Him in prayer.

Scriptures

James 5:14-16

Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven. Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Ephesians 1:17-19

I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better. I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength.

Ephesians 3:14-20

For this reason, I kneel before the Father, from whom every family[a] in heaven and on earth derives its name. I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge – that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

GAMES

1, 2, 3 ESCONDITE INGLÉS (Spain)

This game, known as Red Light, Green Light in the United States, is a typical schoolyard game in Spain.

What you need: a marked starting line

How to play:

- Choose one child to be "IT."
- "IT" stands facing a wall or tree a reasonable distance from the starting line with his or her back to the rest of the children.
- The other children stand at the starting line.
- The leader gives a signal, and the children begin to move toward "IT."
- "IT" says "1, 2, 3 Calabaza" and spins around quickly, trying to catch the others as they move.
- While "IT" is watching, the children must stand completely still.
- If "IT" catches a child moving, that child must return to the starting line.
- Repeat until one child reaches "IT" before he or she can turn around.
- The person who reaches "IT" first becomes the new "IT."
- Play as many rounds as you have time for.

CRAFT

Mosaic Art (Spain)

Mosaics are pictures created by arranging small colored tiles, glass or stone. Antoni Gaudi was a famous mosaic artist in Spain, and Barcelona is a city known for mosaic art. This art can be found in parks, streets, buildings and even rooftops.

Supplies:

- small, thin wooden shapes (heart, cross, animals, flower, etc.), one per child
- small mosaic tiles or dyed seashell chips
- clear tacky glue
- magnets



Directions:

Children will use the tacky glue to attach mosaic tiles to the wooden shape, fitting them together as closely as possible. Once the piece is entirely covered, attach a magnet to the back.

***Note:** Wooden shapes and mosaic tile pieces can be purchased from a craft store or online.*



FOOD

Children in Spain eat five meals a day. Breakfast and *merienda* (evening snack around 7 p.m.) for children might be milk and cookies (made with whole grains and fiber). To try something similar, buy some “Maria” cookies (usually sold in the Mexican aisle of the grocery store). Or try Nutella (chocolate spread on bread). Another option is to buy some *churros* from a local store or Mexican restaurant.

Serve with milk or fruit juice. Or make some Spanish hot chocolate.



Spanish Hot Chocolate

Ingredients:

- dark chocolate – approximately 2 oz. per cup of milk (can use bars or dark chocolate chips)
- whole milk (at least one cup of milk for each serving)
- sugar – 1/2 tablespoon to 3 tablespoons per cup, depending on desired sweetness
- cornstarch (add until desired thickness)

Directions:

Add cornstarch to a bit of the mix. Mix to form a paste. Warm milk over medium heat until almost boiling. Remove from the heat. Add chocolate to the warm milk and stir until it's all melted. Add the cornstarch and mix until smooth. Add sugar to taste. Return the pan to the stove on low heat for 2-5 minutes.



Another Simple Snack: Children in Spain love to eat sunflower seeds. They crack the shell open with their teeth, eat the seed inside and throw away the shell.

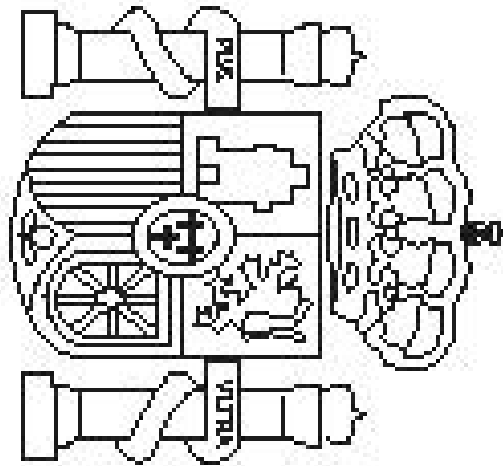

Map of Spain

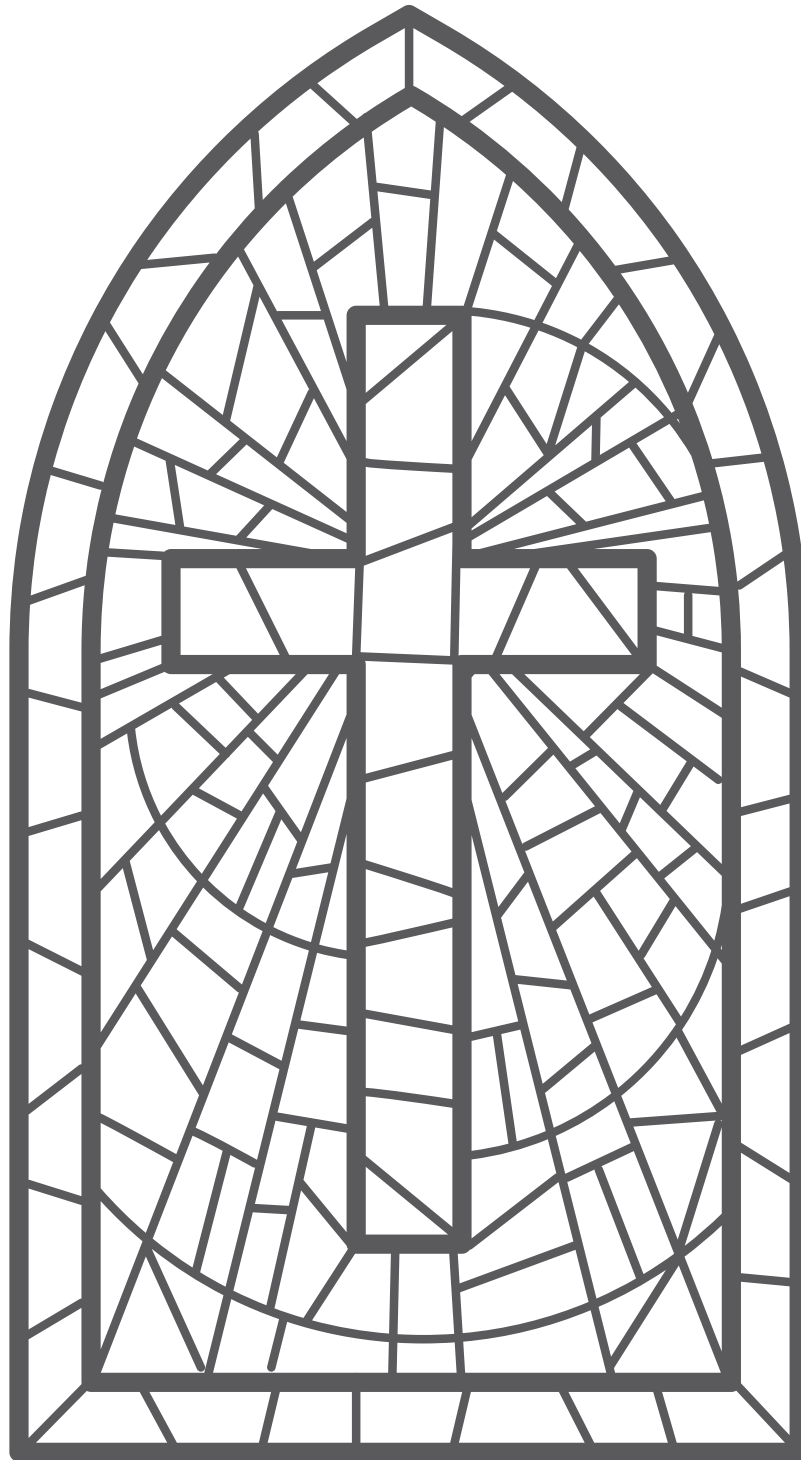

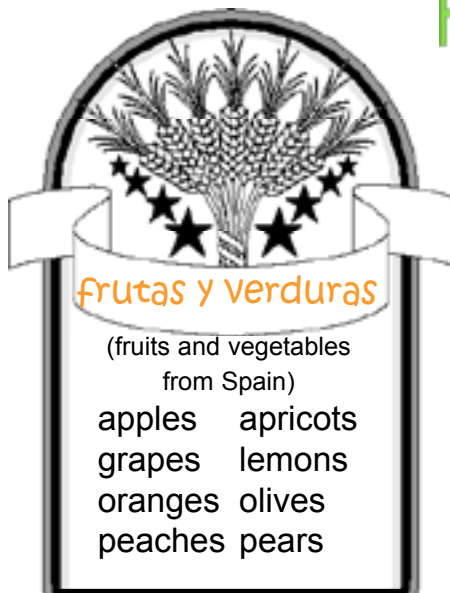
